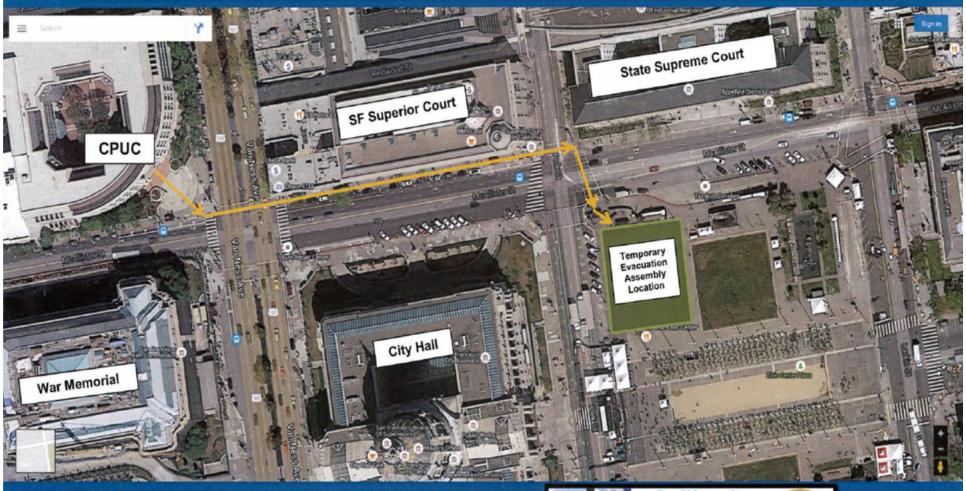

Public Comment

Regular Agenda – Energy Orders

Item # 48 (Previously Item # 8) [14409] – Approving Modification of Decision 14-06-018 and Granting a Waiver of the Three-Year Filing Requirement Contained in Decision 07-07-004

A09-11-015 - In the Matter of the Application of PacifiCorp, an Oregon Company, for an Order Authorizing a General Rate Increase Effective January 1, 2011.

Ratesetting

Comr. Picker / Judge Wilson

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Grants PacifiCorp's Petition to Modify Decision (D.) 14-06-018 in Application 09-11-015, and authorizes PacifiCorp to: 1) make a Post-Test Year Adjustment Mechanism (PTAM) Attrition Factor filing effective January 1, 2017; 2) forgo filing a General Rate Case (GRC) application for Test Years 2016 and 2017 (as required by D.07-07-004); 3) file its next GRC application for Test Year 2018; and 4) implement any rate change related to the PTAM by applying the overall PTAM percentage change as a uniform percentage change to all rate elements that were adjusted in PacifiCorp's 2009 GRC, excluding Schedules S-99, S-100, S-190, S-191, S-192, S-199, ECAC-94, GHG-92, and GHG-93.
- Closes the proceeding.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• It is the utility's responsibility to adhere to all Commission rules, decisions, General Orders and statutes including Public Utilities Code Section 451 to take all actions "...necessary to promote the safety, health, comfort, and convenience of its patrons, employees, and the public."

ESTIMATED COST:

No cost is associated with this decision.





Regular Agenda – Energy Orders

Item # 37 [14401] – Violations by Southern California Edison Company of Rule 8.4 and 1.1, and Imposing Sanctions

Order Instituting Investigation on the Commission's Own Motion into the Rates, Operations, Practices, Services and Facilities of Southern California Edison Company and San Diego Gas and Electric Company Associated with the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station Units 2 and 3.

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

 Southern California Edison Company (SCE) shall pay a financial penalty to the General Fund of \$16,740,000 for violations of Commission rules; SCE shall establish public tracking of individual non-public communications where SCE and a Commissioner(s) or advisor are present.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

None as a result of this decision.

ESTIMATED COST:

• \$16,740,000 financial penalty to be paid by SCE to the General Fund.





Regular Agenda – Communication Resolutions and Reports

Item # 41 [14418] – Funding for Bright Fiber Project from the California Advanced Services Fund Grant Application for Nevada County

Res T-17495

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Approves grant funding in the amount of \$16,339,451 and loan funding of \$500,000 from the California Advanced Services
 Fund for the grant application of Bright Fiber Network, Inc. for installation of a fiber-to-the-premises system in rural Nevada
 County.
- Extends gigabit high-speed internet service to an estimated 1,963 households spread amongst about 21 square miles in underserved Nevada County communities, generally between the outskirts of Grass Valley and Colfax.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• The construction of this project would provide redundant broadband infrastructure in the area that provide additional benefits to educational, medical, and public safety entities.

ESTIMATED COST:

• \$16,339,451 grant plus \$500,000 loan paid by ratepayers.

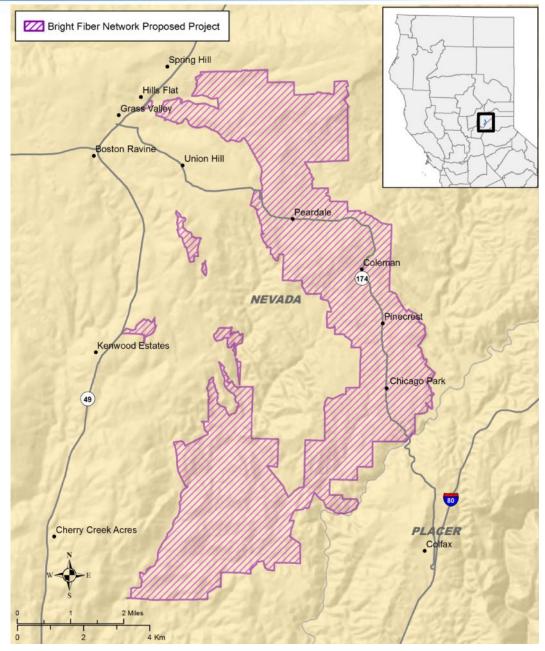

Summary

- Rural Nevada County
- Applied on Feb. 1, 2013
- Fiber-to-the-premises
- 1 Gbps down/up
- 2,272 households requested, but 1,941 eligible
- Grant request: \$16,156,323
 (59.3% of \$27,232,418) /
 \$8,324 per household
- Loan request: \$500,000
- \$10,576,095 in private investor funding
- Performance bond required





Response to Challenges

- Removed areas containing proven wired networks
- Mobile not an issue, per CalSPEED
- Fixed wireless partially serves most of project area
 - Unable to serve 100% of households due to foliage and hills
 - Accepted subscriptions to SERVED speed tiers, but did not carve out neighborhoods
 - Ad hoc setups (right) require additional costs







Bright Fiber Project Advantages

- 1. Not affected by terrain or foliage
- 2. 50 times faster than fastest claimed fixed-wireless option in area
- 3. Future proof to changed definition of "broadband"
- 4. Best value per megabit of all "served" offerings / least-expensive option overall for low-income customers (for at least two years):

Provider (Tier)	Down/Up (Mbps)	Monthly cost	Price per Mb
Smarter Broadband (Basic Ultimate)	6/1.5	\$49	\$6.53
Smarter Broadband (15 Ultimate)	15/4	\$199	\$10.47

ColfaxNet (20)	20/20	\$150	\$3.75
Bright Fiber (Basic)	1,000/1,000	\$119	\$0.06
Bright Fiber (Low Income)	1,000/1,000	\$25	\$0.01





Additional Benefits

Public Safety

- Two medical offices in project area
- No public safety facilities in project area
- Grass Valley CalFire/USFS command center (right) is across street from grant project area and Bright Fiber states it intends to offer redundant service outside grant area





Economic Development

- Staff visited manufacturers and small shops (e.g., left photo)
- They report that fixed wireless speeds are not sufficient
- Observed empty office parks
- Strong community support



Staff Concerns

- Finances of applicant
 - Will seek equity investors for matching funds
 - No provision to repay investors in first five years
 - Requires high, 72-percent take rate to be profitable after five years
- Uncertain CEQA status
 - Applicant claims project is CEQA exempt, but If EIR is required additional costs incurred
- Eligibility
 - No way to independently prove fixed-wireless service availability claims
- RUS Grant to Smarter Broadband
 - Service availability limitations require customers to incur service extension costs
 - Creates appearance of double government funding in project area
- Expensive relative to incremental fixed-wireless deployment

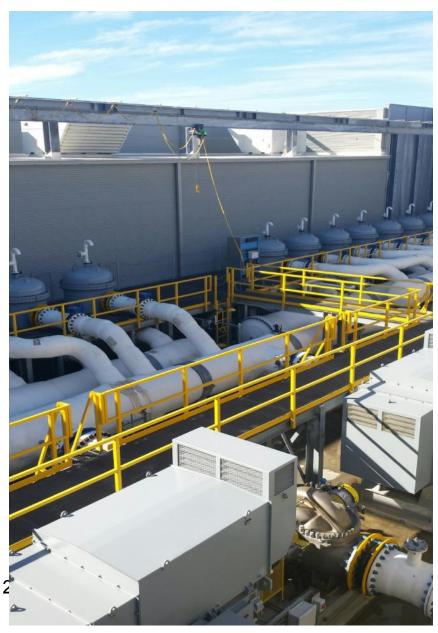
