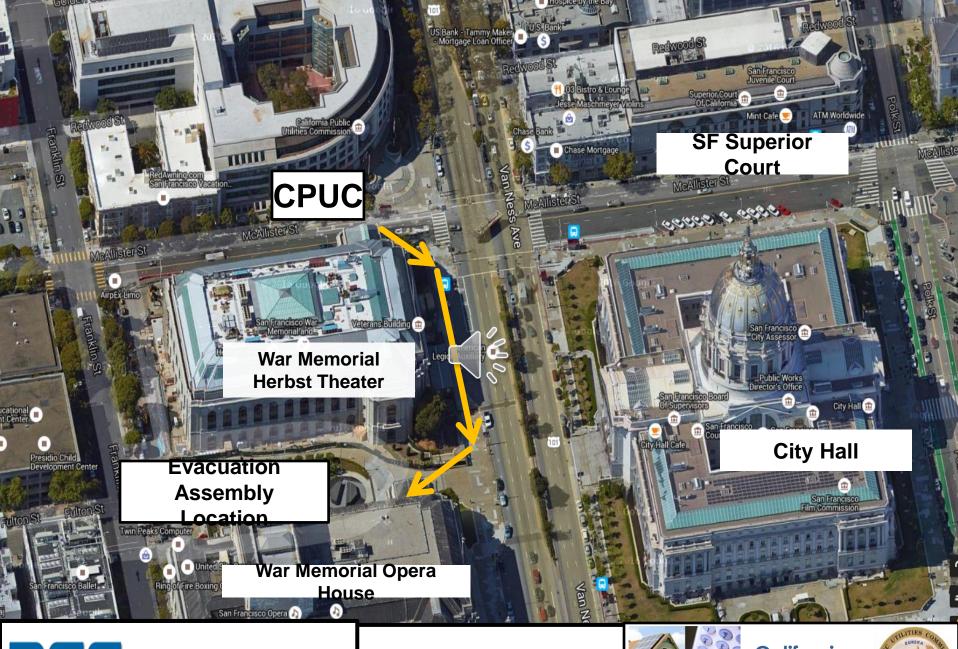

Order Instituting Rulemaking to consider policy and implementation refinements to the Energy Storage Procurement Framework and Design Program (D.13-10-040, D.14-10-045) and related Action Plan of the California Energy Storage Roadmap.

Quasi-Legislative

Comr Peterman - Judge Cooke

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Adopts Rules and framework to allow energy storage providers to provide multiple services from the same resource.
- Closes the proceeding.

No safety implications.

Item # 53 [16083] - Solar on Multifamily Affordable Housing Program Pursuant to Assembly Bill 693

R.14-07-002

Order Instituting Rulemaking to Develop a Successor to Existing Net Energy Metering Tariffs Pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 2827.1, and to Address Other Issues Related to Net Energy Metering.

Ratesetting

Comr Guzman Aceves - Judge Hecht - Judge Simon

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Adopts program to provide incentives to encourage installation of solar generation on multifamily affordable housing, pursuant to Assembly Bill 693 in the service territories of Pacific Gas and Electric Company, San Diego Gas & Electric Company, Southern California Edison Company, Liberty Utilities Company, and PacifiCorp.
- Authorizes administration of the program by single state-wide program administrator to be chosen through a Request for Proposal (RFP) process.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• This decision does not order any action related to safety.

ESTIMATED COST:

 Up to \$100,000,000 per year from the sale of greenhouse gas allowances allocated to the investor-owned utilities.

Item # 54 [16094] – Pacific Gas and Electric Company's Application to Retire the Diablo Canyon Nuclear Power Plant

A16-08-006

Application of Pacific Gas and Electric Company for Approval of the Retirement of Diablo Canyon Power Plant, Implementation of the Joint Proposal, And Recovery of Associated Costs Through Proposed Ratemaking Mechanisms.

Ratesetting

Comr Picker - Judge Allen

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Approves retirement of the Diablo Canyon Power Plant, approves employee retention and retraining programs, approves a settlement of \$18.6 million for previously-incurred relicensing costs. Replacement procurement issues are referred to the Integrated Resource Planning proceeding.
- Closes the proceeding.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• No direct safety impact; may reduce future risks associated with operation of a nuclear power plant.

ESTIMATED COST:

• \$190.4 million.

Item # 55 [16126] - Decision Addressing Statewide Marketing, Education, and Outreach for Residential Rate Reform

R12-06-013

Order Instituting Rulemaking on the Commission's Own Motion to Conduct a Comprehensive Examination of Investor Owned Electric Utilities' Residential Rate Structures, the Transition to Time Varying and Dynamic Rates, and Other Statutory Obligations.

Ratesetting

Comr Picker - Judge McKinney - Judge Park - Judge Tsen

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Adopts scope of work for statewide residential rate reform marketing, education, and outreach (ME&O).
- Authorizes amendments to the existing Energy Upgrade California contract to include strategy and content development work for statewide residential rate reform ME&O.
- Directs Pacific Gas and Electric Company, Southern California Edison Company, and San Diego Gas & Electric Company to issue a competitive request for proposal for the implementation and evaluation work associated with the statewide residential rate reform ME&O campaign.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

• There are no safety considerations associated with this decision.

ESTIMATED COST:

 Authorizes \$31.7 million for strategy and content development work for statewide residential rate reform ME&O campaign.

R15-05-006

Order Instituting Rulemaking to Develop and Adopt Fire-Threat Maps and Fire-Safety Regulations.

Quasi-Legislative

PROPOSED OUTCOME:

- Establishes the High Fire-Threat District as the area for which stricter safety regulations regarding overhead electric power lines and communication lines should apply.
- Adopts proposed fire-safety regulations for the High Fire-Threat District.
- Closes the proceeding.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:

 Adopted regulations will enhance safety in areas with elevated and extreme risk of utility-associated wildfires.

ESTIMATED COST:

• Some incremental costs may result from implementation of the adopted fire-safety regulations; cost recovery for any such costs is addressed and is consistent with Decision 14-02-015.
