

### **Public Comment**

If an individual has signed up using the electronic system on the Commission's website, they must check in with the Public Advisor's Office on the day of the meeting, by the sign-up deadline.
- Once called, each speaker has up to 3 minutes at the discretion of the Commission
   President. Depending on the number of speakers, the time limit may be reduced to 1 minute.

- At the end of the Public Comment Section, the Commission President will ask if there are any
  additional individuals who wish to speak. Individuals who wish to speak but did not sign up by

  additional information about the criteria pollutants associated with serving their load.
- Adopts a Preferred System Portfolio to use as the basis for future planning and to transfer to the California Independent System Operator (CAISO) for use in its Transmission Planning Process (TPP) as the reliability base case and policy-driven base case.
- Adopts two additional cases to transfer to the CAISO as policy-driven sensitivity cases for use in the TPP.
- Commits to beginning a "procurement track" in this proceeding to address options for procuring needed electricity resources.
- Requires LSEs serving load in the territory of Pacific Gas and Electric Company to include in their next IRPs a section addressing retirement of Diablo Canyon.

#### **SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:**

 Addresses the electricity resource portfolio necessary to secure reliable electric service throughout the state.

 Unknown. This decision adopts a plan to 2030, but individual LSEs will need to conduct procurement activities in order to gain information about total cost. This decision does not authorize specific expenditures.





# Roadway Worker Protection (RWP) Program



Roadway Worker Safety Program completely revamped in 2014

- New program approved by the CPUC
- Employees, including managers certified
  - regular recertification required
- New RWP Safety Manual and Procedures
- Near-miss reporting program launched
- Safety Oversight of Contracts working in the ROW brought in house
- Increased training requirements for contractors from 16 to 40 hours



# Wayside Work During Revenue Hours



#### RWP Program is fully compliant with GO175

- BART made an investment in RWP of \$5.3M a year starting in FY15
  - Increased workforce by 40 new EIC and Watch Persons
- Wayside work shifted to non-revenue hours
- Increased Safety Oversight by hiring 2 safety inspectors to perform rules compliance checks during non-revenue hours

#### **GO175 Safety Barrier and Fencing**



- BART has invested \$2.5M in fencing and physical barriers to create a safer working environment
- Train Control equipment being relocated outside of the track zone as interlockings are rebuilt



#### **Employee Safety Training**





#### Safety Training Improvements:

- 2016 RS&S RWP Certification increased from 8 to 16 hours
- 2017 M&E RWP Certification increased from 32 to 40 hours
- 2018 M&E created an 24 hour EIC Certification Program
- Operations Managers required to maintain RWP certification
- 2017 established eBART Safety Training Program

- Extensive CPUC mandated training/certification requirements
- Typically, safety sensitive positions require periodic recertification
- Most modules classification specific, some across the board

  - 4. Safety Shoes






# Safety Reporting and Complaint Investigation

# Internal Safety & Security Audit Program



System Safety audits safety programs managed by Operations and other departments every year

- Scope of audits has expanded by 15% to include Equipment Inspection
- CPUC staff participated and approved BART annual summary reports
- Number of recent audits performed:
  - 2018 RS&S in 39 areas; Procurement in 1; Leave Management in 1; BPD in 1
  - 2017 <u>M&E</u> in 31 areas; System Safety in 11; BPD in 2
  - 2016 <u>Transportation</u> in 22 areas and BPD in 2

# eBART Internal Safety & Security Audit Program



System Safety audits safety programs managed by Operations and other departments every year

- CPUC staff participated and approved eBART's 2018 annual summary report
- Number of recent eBART audits performed:
  - 2018 3 Audits covering 6 sections of the eBART SSPP

#### **Environmental Compliance**



System Safety responsible for control, management and disposal of hazardous materials

- Compliance is maintained to ensure employee safety at the shops, facilities, and other work locations
- <u>Two new full-time positions</u> have been added in System Safety to ensure compliance and support Operations
- M&E Managers are required to perform four Environmental Compliance Safety Checks per month

#### **Safety Culture and SMS**



FTA requires all transit agencies to have an Agency Safety Plan in place by April 2020

- BART Agency Safety Plan will incorporate above safety programs and initiatives
- BART will work closely with CPUC to get the Agency Safety Plan approved

#### **Safety Culture Gap Analysis**



- BART has retained safety experts to conduct comprehensive safety culture assessment and gap analysis in preparation for SMS adoption
- Assessment is ongoing
- Results will be shared with CPUC SED staff
